



2021 Common Good Garden Volunteer COVID-19 Mitigation Policy

For the 2021 growing season or until such time as State and federal guidelines allow otherwise, BTLT will implement and enforce the following policy to support the community-wide effort to mitigate the transmission of the COVID-19 virus among volunteers who engage in working within the CGG at TSCG:

1. All participants will maintain a social distancing space of at least six (6) feet of separation between individuals during each work session.
3. All communal items must be sprayed with sanitizer **before and after** use. This includes all parts of water hydrants (hoses, handles, etc), gate/door handles, and wheelbarrows. Bottles of sanitizer will be located at the gates, next to water hydrants and within the garden shed.
4. CGG volunteers must wear face masks while at the garden.
5. TSCG volunteers who have come into contact with an individual infected with Covid-19 or are feeling ill, have a fever, cough, or other symptoms of the COVID-19 virus will not participate in volunteer work sessions until at least 14 days after symptoms or signs have ended or they have a negative Covid-19 test. Any volunteer that has participated in a previous session and believes they have subsequently contracted the virus will notify the TSCG volunteer coordinator of their condition so that appropriate steps may be initiated with other TSCG volunteers.
8. CGG volunteers will sign up for work days with Dev, no more than 9 may be working at any time.
9. Volunteer hours will be logged online, through the [website](#). This removes the need for pen and paper recording which results in germ spread. If you require assistance with this process email garden@btlit.org or ask Dev Culver, Common Good Garden Coordinator, for assistance.
